On 30 January 1959, a 'Caribbean Carnival' was held at St Pancras Town Hall, north London, as a response to the depressing state of race relations. Mary Seacole

Established the 'British Hotel' during the Crimean War for wounded British soldiers.

She had previously applied to work for the War Office, but was turned down and travelled on her own.

In 2004 she was voted the greatest Black Briton.

In 2016 her statue was unveiled in the grounds of St Thomas' Hospital



Ignatius Sancho (1729-1780)

British composer, actor, and writer.

Born on a slave ship in 1729.

He taught himself to read and spoke out against the slave trade.

He is the first known Black Briton to vote in a British election



The Ivory Bangle Lady

Known as the Ivory Bangle Lady, the skeleton was found in 1901 near York..

Her remains, dated to the second half of the fourth century, were found with jet and elephant ivory bracelets, earrings, pendants, beads, a blue glass jug and a glass mirror.

Research by the University of Reading analysed her facial features, the chemical signature of the food and drink she consumed, and the evidence from the burial site. The research pointed to a high status incomer to Roman York, likely to have been of North African descent.

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IVORY BANGLE LADY

The remains of a Roman woman known as the Ivory Bangle Lady have helped archaeologists discover that wealthy people from across the Empire were living in fourth century York.



Archaeological research on one of the Yorkshire Museum's best-preserved burial finds paints a picture of a cosmopolitan city, a theme explored in our Roman York gallery.
