## Y10 History trip to the National Archives

On Thursday 10 July, Year 10 historians visited the National Archives in Kew to support their GCSE study of Elizabeth I and Migration to Britain. In one session, students explored Elizabeth I's letters and speeches, handled original Tudor documents like the Tide Letter, and practiced deciphering Tudor handwriting to learn about her leadership and governance.



In the second session, students investigated the lives of Indian seafarers (lascars) and examined documents revealing their travels, work, and experiences, including the effects of the 1920 Alien's Order. A key moment was handling the original passenger list from the Empire Windrush, connecting their studies to post-war Caribbean migration and the Windrush Generation.



## Year 10 Creative Writing Club Trip – Penguin Random House

On 8th July, Year 10 creative writers visited Penguin Random House HQ. Students enjoyed presentations on publishing, design processes, and marketing, even receiving free books. Sam (10M) described the trip as "informative, calming, and fun.

## **Duke of Edinburgh Expeditions**


Our Bronze Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) participants recently completed their expedition, which included a three-day trek. Students also shared their experiences completing the personal, physical, and volunteering skill sections of the award.

Highlights from the Expedition:

- Training Day: Students practiced navigation and equipment checks, enjoying scenic views.
- Day 1 & Setting Up Camp: The team walked for approximately six hours, arriving at camp on schedule ready to set up the tents despite windy conditions.
- Day 2: An early start helped avoid the heat, and the group completed their journey back to Chalfont and Latimer station.
   Cooking: Teams prepared meals like pesto pasta, pancakes and sandwiches, learning from both successes and challenges with cooking in the field. We won't be making pancakes again if we do silver award.
- Expedition Aim: The team tracked participants' mental health and attitudes throughout the trip, planning to create a graph of their findings.

#### 'Great Gatsby' at Coliseum

On the evening of Wednesday 18th June, Ms Scott, Ms E-P and Ms Gibson went with 16 English Literature A-Level students to see 'The Great Gatsby' at London's Coliseum, to support the students in their American Literature Comparative and Contextual study (as well as the obvious appeal of the show - and the air-conditioned theatre!)

The show had all the glitz and excesses of the novel, with some excellent songs thrown in. It offered an interesting take on Fitzgerald's novel, and we really enjoyed our outing.

#### 'Backstroke' at Donmar Warehouse

On Tuesday 1st April, Year 12 and 13 Drama students attended a powerful performance of *Backstroke* at the Donmar Warehouse, featuring Tamsin Greig and Celia Imrie. The play tells the moving story of Bo and her mother, weaving together scenes from her mother's final days in hospital with memories of Bo's childhood and her mother's later struggle with Alzheimer's. The cast delivered deeply emotional and captivating performances, leaving the student audience thoroughly engaged throughout.

Thanks to the Donmar's outreach programme, students received free tickets and also took part in a post-show Q&A with the cast and stage management team. This session offered valuable insights into the rehearsal process, backstage stories, and industry advice for aspiring performers.

It was a memorable and inspiring final trip for the

Year 13 students before their upcoming exams.



#### **Year 12 Geography Fieldtrip to Sussex**

At the end of March, the Geography Department took 34 A level students to East Sussex to study coastal landforms, beach morphology and coastal management, as well as gaining some invaluable fieldwork skills needed for their coursework. The students worked hard and the weather just about held, although at times our views were somewhat obscured by the rolling sea fog.





## Year 12 Art Trip to Amsterdam

From 13 to 16 March, Year 12 Art, Photography, and History of Art students took part in a cultural trip to Amsterdam, visiting several of the city's leading museums and galleries. Highlights included the Van Gogh Museum, where students explored Van Gogh's iconic works and his Japanese influences, and the Stedelijk Museum, where they viewed Anselm Keifer's large-scale mixed media pieces. They also visited Rembrandt House to learn about the artist's life and his links to Japanese art.

At the Rijksmuseum, students viewed both American photography and Dutch masterpieces, including Rembrandt's *Night Watch*. The Foam photography museum showcased moving exhibitions by Diana Markhosian, Sakir Khader, and Saul Leiter, covering themes from family history and conflict to innovative uses of colour in photography.

The trip offered a rich mix of historic and contemporary art, providing students with inspiration and insight. A special mention was given to Albert Heijn supermarket as a surprise favourite of the group.


## Florrie - A Football Love Story
